OUTDOOR LEARNING POLICY

Aims and Objectives

At St Michael's C.E Primary School, the aims of Outdoor Learning are:

- To encourage children to have a healthy lifestyle, making the most of the benefits of learning outdoors for both physical and mental health.
- To use outdoor spaces effectively to promote positive relationships and well-being.
- To provide the opportunity for children to develop their gross motor skills and their general health and fitness in the outdoor environment.
- To motivate children and make school an enjoyable experience.
- To encourage children and young people to be aware of and take care of their environment including the flora and fauna.
- To empower children to take ownership of their learning, allowing their minds and bodies to thrive.
- To deliver a wide range of progressive and frequent learning opportunities outside the classroom for all year groups.
- To allow children to express themselves through problem solving, investigations and exploration, promoting all the characteristics of effective learning.
- To make good use of outdoor space so that children are able to learn but working on a larger, more active scale than is possible indoors.
- To provide a safe and secure environment where children can manage and take risks.
- To provide opportunities to work independently and collaboratively with enthusiasm and perseverance.

Outdoor Learning Planning

The expectation is that teaching and learning across all subjects incorporates opportunities for outdoor learning. The curriculum at St Michael's is designed to provide outstanding opportunities for outdoor learning and is planned as part of all National Curriculum subjects/EYFS Curriculum and within a theme. Teaching staff will ensure that there is adequate adult supervision for groups of children working outside and that outdoor learning is well planned. It is the responsibility of the class teacher to ensure that a risk assessment is in place for planned activities and individual children where health and safety may be at risk.

Health and Safety

At St Michael's CE Primary, pupils will be supported in taking risks within a safe and secure environment. Pupils will be taught how to manage these risks. It is important to ensure that the outdoor environment offers challenges and teaches the children how to be safe and aware of others. In the first instance, the school's policies relating to Health and Safety and Risk Assessment should be referred to and applied prior to any outdoor learning activity that may require additional support beyond the reasonable activities one would normally apply within the classroom. The school applies robust safety measures to effectively manage and minimise risks. It is equally important, however, that all involved, including parents acknowledge that a degree of residual risk remains and that all are aware of the degrees of risk that apply to the varying activities.

The School Grounds

At St Michael's Primary we are privileged to have grounds which offer opportunities for both formal and informal learning and play. Reception and Nursery each have their own outdoor environments which offer a wide range of learning opportunities. KS1 and KS2 have access to two playgrounds, two outdoor gyms, access to the Prayer Garden, wooded area, field and pond. Further changes to the outdoor environment are planned this year to increase opportunities for all children.

Recently, a Forest School area has been developed within the school grounds and opportunities are planned into the curriculum for year groups throughout the year. Forest Schools is an alternative way of learning and is taught by an experience practitioner. During a forest school session, children work outside within the forest school area. Sessions are designed to be creative and fun, but also teach children about the environment and keeping themselves safe, including fire safety. Children take part in forest school sessions regardless of the weather.

The Local Environment

The locality around the school offers a wealth of learning opportunities within a manageable distance including Bluebell Woods, Bartley Green Reservoir and the local parks. Learners can develop their skills as they explore their local environment.

Places Further Afield.

Teachers plan opportunities for children to engage in learning beyond the school grounds. Each year group has a planned programme of educational visits which complement and extend learning. These are planned into all aspects of the curriculum and, by taking learners beyond their familiar environment, stimulate their curiosity and imagination and motivate children in a powerful way. Teachers use Evolve to record and submit their risk assessments to the Head teacher at least two weeks before the trip.

Residential Places

Staying away from home is a powerful way of developing key life skills, building confidence, self-esteem, communication and team working, for example. Through visits to outdoor adventure centres such as Whitemoor Lakes, children are provided with an opportunity to widen their range of experiences and find new skills and interests in which they may excel. Risk assessments must be submitted to the local authority and the governing body two months before the trip for approval.

Inclusion and Differentiation: (also see SEN Policy)

All children have the right to an education which is inclusive and which allows all to realise their potential. We operate an inclusive ethos for all our pupils including those with special educational needs. We provide a varied and diverse curriculum that is language-rich and enables all children to access at their own level and progress from their own individual starting point. We encourage all our children to challenge themselves, take risks and immerse themselves in the wider curriculum in order to discover their strengths and celebrate their successes.

EYFS Curriculum

The children in EYFS (Early Years Foundation Stage) have daily access to the outdoors, in the safety of the Nursery and Reception environment. Please see EYFS Teaching and Learning Policy)

Monitoring and review

The class teachers are responsible for monitoring the standard of the children's work and the quality of teaching in the outdoors. The SLT are responsible for supporting colleagues in the teaching in



the outdoors, for being informed about current developments in this area and for providing a strategic lead and direction for outdoor learning in the school. The SLT will evaluate the strengths and weaknesses in the subject and indicate areas for further improvement.
