Morning Snack (KS2)

Please can you ensure that children in KS2 are bringing in a healthy morning snack into school. If they are not ordering toast then they are able to bring in a piece of fruit from home. This should be the only type of snack they bring into school. Thank you.

Phonics

At St Michael's, we teach our children to read using a scheme called Little Wandle which is a systematic and synthetic phonics programme. We teach this programme from Nursery to Year 2. We have uploaded lots of useful resources onto the phonics page of our school website which you can use at home. Phonics Resources

Year 1 Phonics Screening Check

All children in Year 1 will complete the Phonics Screening Check during the week of the 10th June. This is a check of your child's phonics knowledge. The Phonics Screening Check contains 40 words divided into two sections of 20 words. Both sections contain a mixture of real words and pseudo-words (alien words). The check is designed to give teachers information on how your child is progressing in phonics. It will help to identify whether your child needs additional support at this stage so that they do not fall behind in this vital early reading skill. 

What is happening in the classroom?

Nursery

In the space of a week, our caterpillars have doubled in size and many of them are now forming chrysalis' in preparation for their transformation into beautiful butterflies.

The children have been so interested in the caterpillar's progress and ask everyday how they are getting on. We have enjoyed looking at the caterpillars through magnifying glasses and have even witnessed one spinning a cocoon right in front of our eyes! Amazing!

We have learnt the names of farm animal babies and looked at different types of farms, including what produce we get from each, wool from sheep, milk from cows, flour from wheat crops for example. The children have also worked together to create a collaborative farm picture, used wellies to create paint prints and enjoyed washing the tractors in the water tray car wash.

Reception

RG

This week in Maths Reception have been learning about time. We have used time as a measurement. We have been predicting how many times we can do a star jump in one minute and how long we can balance on one foot for. Outside we have been weeding the garden and watering the plants, helping them to grow.

RS

We have been exploring fruit and vegetables this week. We have used magnifying glasses to explore the inside of fruit and vegetables and the seeds inside them. We then used pencils and watercolours to do observational drawings of the fruits and vegetables and used our phonics to label them.

In science this week, the children have been comparing trees and plants. They also observed their growing seeds. The children were shocked at the height of the sunflowers with the tallest one now standing at 25cm. The children secretly think there may be a beanstalk growing amongst them.

With the upcoming phonics screening, the children have been working super hard with all of their sounds, alternative sounds, diagraphs, trigraphs segmenting and blending. I am so proud of all of the children as their hard word is now showing.

1M

The children have been super busy this week with their phonics as we have the screening coming up next term. We have been practicing all our sounds daily and making sure we spot the digraph or trigraph first before sounding the word out. In History we answered our Big Question which was to describe what Weoley Castle was like? The children had some great answers and even drew a picture of what it looked like in the past and what it looks like now.

Year 2

2K

This week we have been working very hard to write our own banning story. The Kings and Queens have banned the light, the dark, the rain and even school. The children have thought of lovely ideas to include in their stories. In Maths this week we have been working hard to learn about mass and capacity. In art we practised painting and we created a rollercoaster picture.

2R

In English this week the children have been working super hard writing their story's, I am super proud of what they have produced, it is clear they have spent a lot of time and effort thinking about their sentences. We have also been focusing on our shading skills in Art and recapping some of the influential people in History.

3D

This week in History, the children have been exploring daily life for scribes and craftsmen and they learnt how to write their name in hieroglyphs. In Maths, we have continued our topic of telling the time on an analogue clock and a digital clock.

3T

In PSHE, the children have been learning about their rights and have been discussing which rights they think are most important to them. In History, the children have been exploring daily life for scribes and craftsmen and they learnt how to write their name in hieroglyphics. In Maths, we looked at time on a digital clock and looked at both am and pm.

Year 4

4J

4J have been getting ready for their Multiplication Test which they will be taking within the first two weeks after half term. Children have been trying hard to maintain their score or beat it! During writing lessons, children have completed their diary where they used their imagination to use emotive language.

4J have been covering a difficult concept in maths, round decimals to the nearest whole number.

Amazingly, children have been resilient and used their knowledge to answer problem solving and reason questions.

4R

4R have been working really hard this week, preparing for their MTC which will be taking place within the first two weeks after half-term. All pupil shave been making excellent progress with their practise scores! The children have completed their diary entries this week and used some fantastic emotive language. In Maths, 4R have been rounding decimals to the nearest whole number and have used perseverance to help them with their reasoning and problem solving skills.

5H

This week during maths we have been looking at working out angles on a straight line and used this knowledge to calculate missing angles. During English, we have been writing a survival guide giving instructions about how to create a survival tin or build an effective fire. We have also been practising our Pentecost assembly ready to perform in Church next week.

5F

This week in English, 5F have been planning and writing a successful survival guide that will instruct survivors on how to create an effective fire or build a shelter. This week during maths we have been looking at working out angles on a straight line and used this knowledge to calculate missing angles. We have also been practising our Pentecost assembly ready to perform in Church next week.

Year 6

Oh wow! We could not be more proud of the wonderful year six children - they have blown us away with their determination and perseverance this week as they have completed their SATs. It was wonderful to see them enjoying breakfast with their classmates, ready to show off their KS2 learning! The children have shown fantastic progress in our cricket sessions and they have had the opportunity to wind down by completing mindfulness activities, such as colouring outside with their friends. We have continued our RE topic about temptation and have thought about how forgiveness can help us move on. Ending our week with a pizza party and a surprise visit from Mrs Hession truly topped off a fantastic week. Well done super Year Six!

Measles


As you may be aware, across Birmingham there has been an outbreak of measles. Please read the following information which has been issued:

- There's no specific medical treatment for measles, so it's important to get vaccinated as it's the best protection against becoming seriously unwell.
 - Measles usually starts with cold-like symptoms, followed by a rash a few days later.
- You should ask for an urgent GP appointment or get help from NHS 111 if you think you or your child may have measles.
 - Don't go to the GP or any other healthcare setting without calling them first.
- If your child has been diagnosed with measles by a doctor, they should stay off nursery or school for at least 4 days from when the rash first appears. They should also avoid close contact with babies and anyone who is pregnant or has a weakened immune system.
 - Parents can book a free vaccine through the GP but if a child has already been vaccinated it is
 very unlikely that they have measles. 'It's fine to send your child to school with a minor cough or
 common cold, provided they don't have a temperature'. The incubation period is the length of
 time it can take to develop the illness after being in contact with someone with measles. For
 measles, the incubation period can be up to 21 days.

What you need to bring to school

A reminder of what to bring to school:

✓ A water bottle (please make sure it has yourname on it). This should only have water in it and have a pop up top (not a screw top as if these fall over on the desks, they will ruin the children's work).

✓ A school bag or bookbag.

- √ A healthy fruit snack for breaktime (Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are provided with this).
- \checkmark You can bring your scooter or bike to school if you wish. Please remember to wear a helmet and not to ride them whilst on school grounds.

X As always, please remember not to bring in any toys or stationery from home, unless it has been specifically requested by your teacher.

X No non-prescribed medication. Any medication that has been prescribed must be handed by the parent/carer to the school office staff who will ask you to complete a medication form detailing-permission and dosage.

Medical and Dietary Information

It is very important that we have up-to-date medical information including new Care Plans so we will be sending these out for you to review, complete and return. Any other updated health information should be sent in via the school office.

Please remember to inform the school of any changes to your child's medical or dietary needs.

Please also ensure that any prescribed medication, including an inhaler or EpiPen, is in-date and in school
- it is parents responsibility to ensure this.

Free School Meals, Toast and Price Changes

All children in Year's Reception - Year 2 are entitled to a 'Universal Free School Meal'.

When a child enters Year 3 this entitlement ends. If you would like your child to receive a school dinner your will need to:

- Check you eligibility for a FSM here: <u>Online FSM Application (cloudforedu.org.uk)</u> School will be notified of the outcome of your application and proceed accordingly.
- Top up your 'School Food United' account to ensure there are funds to pay for your child's meals.

 The price for a school meal for the academic year 23/24 is £2.80 per day. Remember that these need to be ordered by **8.30 am** each day.
 - We will no longer be accepting cash for toast, this will also need to be ordered each down through 'School Food United' The cost per day is 25p. Children will receive their toast at their break time between around 10.30am. Remember that these need to be ordered by **8.30 am** each day.

• We sent out guidance of how to create/use your 'School Food United' app via Arbor last week - if you require any further assistance please speak to a member of the school office.

Birthdays

Natasha's Law came into effect on 1st October 2021. We appreciate that there may be some special times throughout the year when children may wish to bring sweets or chocolate in to share with their friends (e.g birthdays), please may we ask that children only bring in prepacked sweets such as Haribos which can then be handed out at the end of the day before children go and see their parents or guardians. Please understand that we cannot accept any homemade or individual sweets as this will not comply with Natasha's Law or current allergen requirements.

Nut Free School

A reminder that the school is a nut-free zone as several children and members of staff have severe nut allergies. Please make sure that no nuts are brought to school and please check the ingredients on packets carefully. Thank you for helping us to keep all our community safe.

School Uniform

- White polo shirt (with/without logo).
- Red sweatshirt or cardigan (with or without logo).
 - Grey or black trousers, skirt or pinafore.
 - Red and white check dress (summer).
 - Grey or black shorts (summer).
 - Black shoes.





P.E Uniform

- Red or black shorts.
- White t-shirt (with or without the school logo).
 - Black bumps/trainers.
- Black tracksuit bottoms for outdoor games in winter.

Pumps are needed for indoor PE and must come in a separate bag for children to change into for the lesson. Trainers are not to be worn inside. Please make sure that your child has a pair of pumps onsite in case the weather means we need to do P.E inside.

You can also purchase a hoodie with the school logo on for P.E. from the office. This is not compulsory.



Labelling

We understand how much a new uniform and school items cost and we try our best to ensure the children look after their clothing and bags. Please label your child's clothing, bags, lunch boxes, shoes and water bottles to help us return lost items to their owner.
