Message from Mrs Roberts

Dear parents, carers and students,

I hope this message finds you all well and refreshed after a lovely half-term break. As we return to school, I wanted to extend a warm welcome back to all our students, staff, and families. We're excited to continue our journey of learning and discovery together.

We have our Pupil Progress Meetings this half term so are really looking forward to meeting with you and being able to celebrate your children's successes. Please look out for the invite on Arbor to sign up for a time that is convenient for you.

We are focusing on the values of love and forgiveness this half term. During Collective Worship, we have been reading The story of Zacchaeus the Tax Collector, found in the New Testament in the Gospel of Luke (Luke 19:1-10). This story is a wonderful example of forgiveness.

- 1. Zacchaeus' Mistakes: Zacchaeus was a tax collector, and in those days, many people didn't like tax collectors because some of them were not fair or honest. Zacchaeus might have made some mistakes in the past by being unfair or greedy with people's money.
- 2. Meeting Jesus: When Zacchaeus heard that Jesus was coming to his town, he was curious and wanted to see him. However, because Zacchaeus was short, he couldn't see over the crowd. So, he climbed up a tree to get a better view.

3. Jesus' Love: Jesus noticed Zacchaeus up in the tree and told him to come down because he wanted to visit his house. This surprised everyone because Zacchaeus wasn't very popular. Jesus showed that he loved Zacchaeus, even though he had made mistakes.

4. Zacchaeus' Change: When Zacchaeus met Jesus, he felt sorry for the wrong things he had done. He promised to give back money he had taken wrongly and to help people who were poor. This showed that Zacchaeus wanted to change and make things right.

5. Forgiveness and Friendship: Jesus forgave Zacchaeus for his mistakes and became his friend. Jesus showed everyone that no matter what mistakes we make, if we are truly sorry and want to change, he will forgive us and help us become better people.

Dogs on the playground

A quick reminder please that we cannot have any dogs on the playground. This is to ensure the safety of all of our children.

Social Media

A quick plea, that if you have a query or concern regarding processes at the school that you contact us directly rather posting on social media. This way accurate information will be shared.

We are trying to teach the children how to use social media safely and responsibly so your support with this is appreciated.

Thank you for those parents and carers who continue to bring this to our attention.

Online Safety

We have had a few children mention Jeffy so we wanted to make you aware of this YouTube cartoon character by sharing this information from Safer Schools.

What is Jeffy?

- Jeffy is a puppet character featured in series of YouTube videos. The channel behind Jeffy has over five million subscribers and each video posted gains millions of views.
- The character of Jeffy has been criticised for portraying an offensive stereotype of someone with unspecified learning difficulties or disability. The creator has argued against this characterisation, saying Jeffy is meant to be funny and does not represent someone with a disability.
- Despite the video's child-friendly animation style, online safety experts found videos portraying sexual content, nudity, violence, gore, profanity and more inappropriate themes.

What are the risks of Jeffy and other adult-animations to children and young people?

- As the style of these animations is similar to other videos they view, children and young people may click onto content without realising it contains harmful material.
- Even after viewing, a child may not realise how problematic the behaviour they've viewed is if they believe they are watching an age-appropriate cartoon.
- Children and young people may copy behaviours and language they have viewed. This is not exclusive to the home environment as some content shows settings outside of the home, for example Jeffy at school.

• When exposed to inappropriate content, such as sexualised content, children may struggle to explain to an adult what they have seen and/or what is upsetting them, or they may worry they will get into trouble.

Top Tips

- **Stay calm**. If you suspect the child or young person in your care has watched Jeffy or other inappropriate cartoon-style content, don't panic. Approach them calmly, ask open questions and listen. Importantly, avoid mentioning Jeffy or similar animations by name as you may be accidentally alerting them to something they knew nothing about!
- **Talk to them**. If you know for sure they have viewed inappropriate content, ask them to explain what they have seen and give them space to tell you in their own words. It may be emotional or embarrassing to discuss, but being able to talk through complex feelings in a supportive environment will help them.
- Never leave the safeguarding to someone else. Even though platforms like YouTube have age restrictions and moderators, they are not perfect and should not be relied upon to keep the child or young person in your care safe online.
- Identify help. It's important that children and young people have someone they can turn to for help, even if that person is not you.
- **Check safety settings**. Ensure the correct safety settings are in place on the devices your child has access to and use the <u>Online Safety Centre</u> to learn how to restrict content, block and report on the platform.
- **Keep the conversation going**. Your child's online safety should be an ongoing discussion. Just as you would ask questions about their offline life, make their online experiences just as regular a topic in your household or the classroom.

Attendance









What is happening in the classroom?

Nursery

With pancake day falling in the half term this year, Nursery celebrated and learned about all things 'pancake' in the first week back! We have practised our cutting skills by decorating pancakes with paper fruit, written shopping lists for pancake making, served pancakes in our role play cafe and had pancake races using our pancakes and frying pans along the playground pathway.

At the end of our week, the children assisted with making our own pancakes. They weighed out and measured the ingredients, whisked the batter and cut the fruit. We then chose our own toppings and enjoyed eating our snack with strawberries and chocolate sauce.

Reception

RG

This week Reception have been writing instructions for how to catch a wolf from the story of Little Red Riding hood. We have also baked cupcakes to take to Grannies house.

It has been lovely having the children back after their break. This week they have been working very hard in maths. The children have enjoyed learning about length. Measles


As you may be aware, across Birmingham there has been an outbreak of measles. Please read the following information which has been issued:

- There's no specific medical treatment for measles, so it's important to get vaccinated as it's the best protection against becoming seriously unwell.
 - Measles usually starts with cold-like symptoms, followed by a rash a few days later.
- You should ask for an urgent GP appointment or get help from NHS 111 if you think you or your child may have measles.
 - Don't go to the GP or any other healthcare setting without calling them first.
- If your child has been diagnosed with measles by a doctor, they should stay off nursery or school for at least 4 days from when the rash first appears. They should also avoid close contact with babies and anyone who is pregnant or has a weakened immune system.
- Parents can book a free vaccine through the GP but if a child has already been vaccinated it is very unlikely that they have measles. 'It's fine to send your child to school with a minor cough or common cold, provided they don't have a temperature'. The incubation period is the length of time it can take to develop the illness after being in contact with someone with measles. For measles, the incubation period can be up to 21 days.

What you need to bring to school

A reminder of what to bring to school:

 \checkmark A water bottle (please make sure it has yourname on it). This should only have water in it and have a pop up top (not a screw top as if these fall over on the desks, they will ruin the children's work).

 \checkmark A school bag or bookbag.

 \checkmark A healthy fruit snack for breaktime (Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are provided with this).

 \checkmark You can bring your scooter or bike to school if you wish. Please remember to wear a helmet and not to ride them whilst on school grounds.

X As always, please remember not to bring in any toys or stationery from home, unless it has been specifically requested by your teacher.

X No non-prescribed medication. Any medication that has been prescribed must be handed by the parent/carer to the school office staff who will ask you to complete a medication form detailing-permission and dosage.

Medical and Dietary Information

It is very important that we have up-to-date medical information including new Care Plans so we will be sending these out for you to review, complete and return. Any other updated health information should be sent in via the school office.

Please remember to inform the school of any changes to your child's medical or dietary needs.

Please also ensure that any prescribed medication, including an inhaler or EpiPen, is in-date and in school - it is parents responsibility to ensure this.

Free School Meals, Toast and Price Changes

All children in Year's Reception - Year 2 are entitled to a 'Universal Free School Meal'.

When a child enters Year 3 this entitlement ends. If you would like your child to receive a school dinner your will need to:

- Check you eligibility for a FSM here: <u>Online FSM Application (cloudforedu.org.uk)</u> School will be notified of the outcome of your application and proceed accordingly.
- Top up your 'School Food United' account to ensure there are funds to pay for your child's meals. The price for a school meal for the academic year 23/24 is £2.80 per day. Remember that these need to be ordered by **8.30 am** each day.
 - We will no longer be accepting cash for toast, this will also need to be ordered each down through 'School Food United' The cost per day is 25p. Children will receive their toast at their break time between around 10.30am. Remember that these need to be ordered by **8.30 am** each

• We sent out guidance of how to create/use your 'School Food United' app via Arbor last week - if you require any further assistance please speak to a member of the school office.

Birthdays

Natasha's Law came into effect on 1st October 2021. We appreciate that there may be some special times throughout the year when children may wish to bring sweets or chocolate in to share with their friends (e.g birthdays), please may we ask that children only bring in prepacked sweets such as Haribos which can then be handed out at the end of the day before children go and see their parents or guardians. Please understand that we cannot accept any homemade or individual sweets as this will not comply with Natasha's Law or current allergen requirements.

Nut Free School

A reminder that the school is a nut-free zone as several children and members of staff have severe nut allergies. Please make sure that no nuts are brought to school and please check the ingredients on packets carefully. Thank you for helping us to keep all our community safe.

- White polo shirt (with/without logo).
- Red sweatshirt or cardigan (with or without logo).
 - Grey or black trousers, skirt or pinafore.
 - Red and white check dress (summer).
 - Grey or black shorts (summer).
 - Black shoes.



P.E Uniform

- Red or black shorts.
- White t-shirt (with or without the school logo).
 - Black bumps/trainers.
- Black tracksuit bottoms for outdoor games in winter.

Pumps are needed for indoor PE and must come in a separate bag for children to change into for the lesson. Trainers are not to be worn inside. Please make sure that your child has a pair of pumps onsite in case the weather means we need to do P.E inside.

You can also purchase a hoodie with the school logo on for P.E. from the office. This is not compulsory.

We understand how much a new uniform and school items cost and we try our best to ensure the children look after their clothing and bags. Please label your child's clothing, bags, lunch boxes, shoes and water bottles to help us return lost items to their owner.
