Dear Parents, Guardians, and Wonderful Students,

During Collective Worship this week, we have focused on the scripture that underpins our School Christian Value of Thankfulness.

1 Thessalonians 5:18

'Be thankful in all circumstances, for this is gods will for you.'

- 1. Gratitude in All Circumstances: The verse emphasises the importance of maintaining an attitude of thankfulness regardless of the circumstances one faces in life. This doesn't mean pretending that difficult situations don't exist or ignoring pain and suffering, but rather choosing to focus on the good things that exist even amidst challenges.
 - 2. God's Will for You: The verse suggests that being thankful in all circumstances is not just a suggestion but aligns with God's will for believers. It implies that gratitude is an integral aspect of living according to God's plan and brings us closer to understanding and fulfilling our purpose in life.

We spent time reflecting on our blessings, even when times are difficult. We thought about how gratitude is not dependent on our circumstances but is a choice we can make regardless of our situation.

Nursery Places

We currently have places available in our nursery class.

Our nursery caters for children ages 3-4 years old.

Bad Weather Conditions

Should the weather be severe at any point through winter, we will let you know of any closures through Arbor communications.

As we are entering the winter months, I wanted to make you aware of the arrangements for if we are unable to open as a result of weather conditions. We will only do this as a last resort where we think there is a risk to the safety of pupils and staff. We have some staff who travel a long way and at times it may be unsafe for them to do so.

Please also be aware that as the snow often arrives between 7am and 9am, we may be in a position to open later in the morning when the air begins to warm slightly.

If we do need to close, this is what we will do:

- We will make you aware as soon we can via Arbor, the school website and Twitter (X).
- Work will be sent out for the children to complete by 10.30am. This will be sent via Arbor.

The whole school's attendance target is 96%. The whole school attendance for the year so far is **94.3**%. Unfortunately, our persistent absence is **16.9**%. Please ensure your child comes to school every day.

So far this academic year, we have had 17 families taking unauthorised leave in term time (holidays). This has resulted in £2932 in fixed penalty notices issued by Birmingham City Council. We ask that families do not take leave in term time as these will not be authorised by school.



What is happening in the classroom?

Nursery

This week the nursery children heard the story of "Where's Lenny?", a story about a game of hide and seek between parents and their little boy, Lenny. We loved the story so much, we had a big game of hide and seek in the outdoor area. The children loved finding tiny spaces and being creative with their hiding places!

We also learnt about Jonah and the whale. We made paper plate fish, made our own books of the story and talked about the emotions that Jonah may have been feeling at different points. We learnt the word "weight" and looked for things that were heavy and light within the classroom. Then we did a science experiment and dropped two items at the same time, a glue stick and a feather, to see which one would fall first. This was the heavier object.

Reception

This week Reception have been to St Michael's Church, where we had a look at different objects and what they are used for. Reception loved having their parents come in for our poetry workshop and lunch on Tuesday!

RS

This week Reception have been learning about 1 more and 1 less in maths and exploring this in different ways In music they have learnt a rap about the 5 little monkeys jumping on the bed. Please ask them to sing it for you - not forgetting their cool rap poses!

1F

This week in maths, the children have been using base ten resources. The children have been working with numbers up to 50. In science we have been exploring materials, in particular materials which are waterproof. The children took part in an experiment to predict which material would be the best to make an umbrella.

1M

This week in computing, we looked at a new programme called Scratch. The children used this programme to create algorithms and predict their partners algorithm. We also have been using base ten resources in Maths this ween to make numbers to 30. The children have been looking at how many tens and ones each number has.

Year 2

In 2K this week, have been working hard to count change and work out totals when working with Money.

In English we have started to look at instructions. We are going to write instructions of how to build a habitat for their unusual creature. In Geography we have created our own weather station.

2R have continued to work hard in our Maths topic on money. The children have also used instructions in English to build a Bog Baby habitat. The children have also been looking at the growth of animals in science.

Year 3

3D

This week in Maths, the children have been working hard in our topic of measurements. In English, we have been looking at information leaflets with the children researching and gathering information for their writing about waterfalls.

3T

In Science, we have been exploring which poles of the magnet attract or repel when placed near each other. In Art, we have started to make shadow puppets to use when retelling a cat and mouse poem. If possible could you send in any empty cereal boxes by Wednesday 7th February please?

In English, we have been researching natural wonders of the world, specifically focusing on volcanoes and rivers, we will be using this information to help us write an information leaflet.

Year 4

4J

Children in 4J have focused their scientific enquiry skills during their lesson on the topic sound. Using the correct vocabulary, children described the journey of sound from outside the ear to the brain registering the messages sent. 4J used the States of Matter knowledge to describe how sound travels through different mediums. Year Four have started their new writing focus which is an information report.

In maths this week, 4R have been working really hard with their division skills, practising dividing 2 and 3 digit numbers. In science, we learned how sound travels through different mediums and explored what happens to sound waves as it enters our ears. We have also started our new writing topic this week which will be to write an information report about how to defeat a mythical creature.

Year 5

5H

This week we created our own Anglo-Saxon villages and had to explain what we included and why. We have been multiplying fractions during our maths lessons, using prior knowledge to convert improper numbers to mixed fractions. During our English lessons, we have been using formal historical language - it's really made us think!


Year 6

What you need to bring to school

A reminder of what to bring to school:

✓ A water bottle (please make sure it has yourname on it). This should only have water in it and have a pop up top (not a screw top as if these fall over on the desks, they will ruin the children's work).

\sqrt{A} school bag or bookbag.

- ✓ A healthy fruit snack for breaktime (Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are provided with this).
- \checkmark You can bring your scooter or bike to school if you wish. Please remember to wear a helmet and not to ride them whilst on school grounds.
 - X As always, please remember not to bring in any toys or stationery from home, unless it has been specifically requested by your teacher.

X No non-prescribed medication. Any medication that has been prescribed must be handed by the parent/carer to the school office staff who will ask you to complete a medication form detailing-permission and dosage.

Medical and Dietary Information

It is very important that we have up-to-date medical information including new Care Plans so we will be sending these out for you to review, complete and return. Any other updated health information should be sent in via the school office.

Please remember to inform the school of any changes to your child's medical or dietary needs.

Please also ensure that any prescribed medication, including an inhaler or EpiPen, is in-date and in school
- it is parents responsibility to ensure this.

Free School Meals, Toast and Price Changes

All children in Year's Reception - Year 2 are entitled to a 'Universal Free School Meal'.

When a child enters Year 3 this entitlement ends. If you would like your child to receive a school dinner your will need to:

• Check you eligibility for a FSM here: <u>Online FSM Application (cloudforedu.org.uk)</u> School will be notified of the outcome of your application and proceed accordingly.

- Top up your 'School Food United' account to ensure there are funds to pay for your child's meals.

 The price for a school meal for the academic year 23/24 is £2.80 per day. Remember that these need to be ordered by **8.30 am** each day.
 - We will no longer be accepting cash for toast, this will also need to be ordered each down through 'School Food United' The cost per day is 25p. Children will receive their toast at their break time between around 10.30am. Remember that these need to be ordered by **8.30 am** each day.
- We sent out guidance of how to create/use your 'School Food United' app via Arbor last week if you require any further assistance please speak to a member of the school office.

Birthdays

Natasha's Law came into effect on 1st October 2021. We appreciate that there may be some special times throughout the year when children may wish to bring sweets or chocolate in to share with their friends (e.g birthdays), please may we ask that children only bring in prepacked sweets such as Haribos which can then be handed out at the end of the day before children go and see their parents or guardians. Please understand that we cannot accept any homemade or individual sweets as this will not comply with Natasha's Law or current allergen requirements.

Nut Free School

A reminder that the school is a nut-free zone as several children and members of staff have severe nut allergies. Please make sure that no nuts are brought to school and please check the ingredients on packets carefully. Thank you for helping us to keep all our community safe.

 - Grey or black trousers, skirt or pinafore.

 - Grey or black shorts (summer).
 - Black shoes.





P.E Uniform

- Red or black shorts.
- White t-shirt (with or without the school logo).
 - Black bumps/trainers.
- Black tracksuit bottoms for outdoor games in winter.

Pumps are needed for indoor PE and must come in a separate bag for children to change into for the lesson. Trainers are not to be worn inside. Please make sure that your child has a pair of pumps onsite in case the weather means we need to do P.E inside.

You can also purchase a hoodie with the school logo on for P.E. from the office. This is not compulsory.
