Phonics

At St Michael's, we teach our children to read using a scheme called Little Wandle which is a systematic and synthetic phonics programme. We teach this programme from Nursery to Year 2. We have uploaded lots of useful resources onto the phonics page of our school website which you can use at home. <u>Phonics</u> <u>Resources</u>

Year 1 Phonics Screening Check

All children in Year 1 will complete the Phonics Screening Check during the week of the 10th June. This is a check of your child's phonics knowledge. The Phonics Screening Check contains 40 words divided into two sections of 20 words. Both sections contain a mixture of real words and pseudo-words (alien words). The check is designed to give teachers information on how your child is progressing in phonics. It will help to identify whether your child needs additional support at this stage so that they do not fall behind in this vital early reading skill. There is lots of useful information about the Phonics Screening Check for Year 1 parents on our website. <u>Phonics Screening Check Information</u> If you have any questions about phonics or the Phonics Screening Check, please speak to your child's class teacher or to Mr Bhatti our Deputy Headteacher.



What is happening in the classroom?

Nursery

Welcome back to all our children after our refreshing half term break. We hope you had a lovely time with your families.

This week the children have enjoyed getting stuck in to our new topic looking at transport and travel. Our big question for this topic is 'How do we get places?' The children enjoyed sharing experiences of different modes of transport and showing photographs of themselves riding in different vehicles.

The nursery children joined in with our whole school art project, 'No Place Like Home', looking at empathy for others. We listened to the story 'The Suitcase' about a new friend who appears carrying a suitcase with nothing more than a broken teacup and a photograph of their home inside. We talked about how the suitcase was special to the friend and the objects inside reminded them of home, making them feel safe. We talked about security blankets and how some children feel safer when they have a special toy or blanket to cuddle. We then used household items like the tea cup in the suitcase to paint our own security blanket. The children enjoyed exploring the different types of marks they could make with the various utensils. Well done for a great first week back everyone!

Reception

RG

This week in Reception we have started our new topic answering the question, 'What is the seaside like?'. The children have been exploring different features of the seaside through role play. We have started our new book in Literacy called the Storm Whale, the children have come up with great ideas about how they could help the whale get from the beach back into the sea.

RS

In maths we have been learning about sharing and deciding if a group is equal or not equal. We did this by having a teddy bears picnic and making sure that everyone had an equal amount of raisins by sharing them 1 by 1. The children then enjoyed exploring this further during there independent play outside in the role play area.

1F

It's been lovely to have the children back in class after the holiday. This has been both a busy and exciting week for them all. The children are working very hard ahead of their upcoming phonics screening and are enjoying practicing all their sounds. This week has been our schools Art and Poetry competition week. The children have been working hard to create their very own acrostic poem which is linked to Empathy. The children explored the story 'Boundless Sky' and came up with words linked to Empathy. These words were then used to create their acrostic poem.

For Art we read the story 'My name is not Refugee' and thought about how the characters were feeling and how it made them feel. The children then created a landscape picture using water colours. The children thought about how their painting could show empathy and explain how refugees must travel away from their home to reach safety.

1M

The children have had a great first week back. In English we have been writing our poem which links to Empathy and the story we have been reading is Boundless Sky. The children have enjoyed reading this book and thinking about how they can emphasise with the characters. In Art we have also been creating a picture that links to refugees. They have created a background picture using water colours. We discussed which colours they could use to show how children would feel if they had to flee their home because it is unsafe.

Year 2

2K have been very busy this week learning all about empathy for our art and poetry week. Every child has created a piece of art work and a poem for the BDMAT competition. In Maths this week we have been learning about time. Some of the areas of time we have found challenging like quarter past and quarter to but we have kept on trying and not given up. Keep practising at home. This week we focused on o'clock, half past and Quarter to.

2R have had a lovely first week back. This week has been Art and Poetry week for the BDMAT competition, the children have been busy learning about the meaning of the word 'empathy' and creating a piece of art and a poem to represent this word. The children have shared some fabulous ideas. We have also started looking at time in Maths which is challenging but the children have listened and worked hard to try and understand.

Year 3

3D

This week, the children have taken part in an Art and Poetry competition. In English, the children have been working hard to plan and write their own Haiku poem focusing on the topic of empathy. In Art, the children created their own artwork using sketching and tone, linking to the topic of empathy.

3Т

This week, we have started both our new PE topics; rounders and athletics and the children have enjoyed their first lesson. We have been writing a Haiku poem in English based on the book 'The Day War Came' by Nicola Davies. In Art, we created artwork based on the same story using sketching and tone, linking it to the topic of empathy.

4J

This week, 4J started their Multiplication Check! Children have been extremely positive and shared their thoughts to others to put them at ease when they take theirs. During Art and Writing lessons this week children have been learning about the concept empathy for the BDMAT competition.

4R

This week, 4R have been working hard towards our Art and poetry competition. In writing, we have been working hard to make a rhyming couplet poem all about empathy and how we might show empathy in the classroom. In art, we have been creating a piece using ink using other art works based on empathy as inspiration. In Maths, we have moved on from money and have begun our time unit. comparing days, weeks and months.

Year 5

5F

5F have been busy exploring the terms belonging and empathy to help them create ideas for both the art and poetry competition they are entering. They have produced some thoughtful pictures and hope you will come into school to see them. During maths, we have been looking at translation and learnt that it means to move something from one point to another. In our PE lessons, we are looking at different aspects of athletics and we are really working hard to develop our skills.

5H

5H have been busy exploring the terms belonging and empathy to help them create ideas for both the art and poetry competition they are entering. They have produced some thoughtful pictures and hope you will come into school to see them. During maths, we have been looking at translation and learnt that it means to move something from one point to another. In our PE lessons, we are looking at different aspects of athletics and we are really working hard to develop our skills.

It has been a wonderful first week back in Year 6 and we have been so impressed with the children's mature and sensible attitudes as they return for their final term at St Michael's. We have been busy creating our poems and artwork for the BDMAT Art and Poetry Competition, exploring themes of empathy and belonging. The children have created some wonderful work around these themes, writing narrative poems and artwork inspired by 'Guernica' by Picasso. In RE, we have been exploring the idea of spirituality and the children have created some beautiful art work to express their own feelings of spirituality. Well done for a great first week Year 6!

Measles


As you may be aware, across Birmingham there has been an outbreak of measles. Please read the following information which has been issued:

- There's no specific medical treatment for measles, so it's important to get vaccinated as it's the best protection against becoming seriously unwell.
 - Measles usually starts with cold-like symptoms, followed by a rash a few days later.
- You should ask for an urgent GP appointment or get help from NHS 111 if you think you or your child may have measles.
 - Don't go to the GP or any other healthcare setting without calling them first.
- If your child has been diagnosed with measles by a doctor, they should stay off nursery or school for at least 4 days from when the rash first appears. They should also avoid close contact with babies and anyone who is pregnant or has a weakened immune system.
- Parents can book a free vaccine through the GP but if a child has already been vaccinated it is very unlikely that they have measles. 'It's fine to send your child to school with a minor cough or common cold, provided they don't have a temperature'. The incubation period is the length of time it can take to develop the illness after being in contact with someone with measles. For measles, the incubation period can be up to 21 days.

What you need to bring to school

A reminder of what to bring to school:

 \checkmark A water bottle (please make sure it has yourname on it). This should only have water in it and have a pop up top (not a screw top as if these fall over on the desks, they will ruin the children's work).

 \checkmark A school bag or bookbag.

✓ A healthy fruit snack for breaktime (Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are provided with this).

 \checkmark You can bring your scooter or bike to school if you wish. Please remember to wear a helmet and not to ride them whilst on school grounds.

X As always, please remember not to bring in any toys or stationery from home, unless it has been specifically requested by your teacher.

X No non-prescribed medication. Any medication that has been prescribed must be handed by the parent/carer to the school office staff who will ask you to complete a medication form detailing-permission and dosage.

Medical and Dietary Information

It is very important that we have up-to-date medical information including new Care Plans so we will be sending these out for you to review, complete and return. Any other updated health information should be sent in via the school office.

Please remember to inform the school of any changes to your child's medical or dietary needs.

Please also ensure that any prescribed medication, including an inhaler or EpiPen, is in-date and in school - it is parents responsibility to ensure this.

Free School Meals, Toast and Price Changes

All children in Year's Reception - Year 2 are entitled to a 'Universal Free School Meal'.

When a child enters Year 3 this entitlement ends. If you would like your child to receive a school dinner your will need to:

• Check you eligibility for a FSM here: <u>Online FSM Application (cloudforedu.org.uk)</u> School will be notified of the outcome of your application and proceed accordingly.

- Top up your 'School Food United' account to ensure there are funds to pay for your child's meals. The price for a school meal for the academic year 23/24 is £2.80 per day. Remember that these need to be ordered by **8.30 am** each day.
 - We will no longer be accepting cash for toast, this will also need to be ordered each down through 'School Food United' The cost per day is 25p. Children will receive their toast at their break time between around 10.30am. Remember that these need to be ordered by **8.30 am** each day.
- We sent out guidance of how to create/use your 'School Food United' app via Arbor last week if you require any further assistance please speak to a member of the school office.

Birthdays

Natasha's Law came into effect on 1st October 2021. We appreciate that there may be some special times throughout the year when children may wish to bring sweets or chocolate in to share with their friends (e.g birthdays), please may we ask that children only bring in prepacked sweets such as Haribos which can then be handed out at the end of the day before children go and see their parents or guardians. Please understand that we cannot accept any homemade or individual sweets as this will not comply with Natasha's Law or current allergen requirements.

Nut Free School

A reminder that the school is a nut-free zone as several children and members of staff have severe nut allergies. Please make sure that no nuts are brought to school and please check the ingredients on packets carefully. Thank you for helping us to keep all our community safe.

School Uniform

- White polo shirt (with/without logo).
- Red sweatshirt or cardigan (with or without logo).
 - Grey or black trousers, skirt or pinafore.

- Red and white check dress (summer).
 - Grey or black shorts (summer).
 - Black shoes.



P.E Uniform

- Red or black shorts.
- White t-shirt (with or without the school logo).
 - Black bumps/trainers.
- Black tracksuit bottoms for outdoor games in winter.

Pumps are needed for indoor PE and must come in a separate bag for children to change into for the lesson. Trainers are not to be worn inside. Please make sure that your child has a pair of pumps onsite in case the weather means we need to do P.E inside.

You can also purchase a hoodie with the school logo on for P.E. from the office. This is not compulsory.

We understand how much a new uniform and school items cost and we try our best to ensure the children look after their clothing and bags. Please label your child's clothing, bags, lunch boxes, shoes and water bottles to help us return lost items to their owner.
