Message from Mrs Roberts

Dear Parents and Carers,

During Collective Worship this week, we have been reflecting on the story of Hannukah.

The Story of Hanukkah:

Long ago, in ancient Israel, there was a time of great struggle. The Jewish people faced oppression and were forbidden from practicing their faith freely. Their temple was desecrated, and they longed for freedom and the ability to worship in peace.

However, hope emerged in the form of a small group of brave individuals led by Judah Maccabee. They refused to give in to despair and fought for their beliefs. Against all odds, they reclaimed their temple.

The Miracle of the Oil:

As part of the temple's rededication, a lamp, known as the menorah, needed to be lit. But there was only enough oil for one day, and it would take eight days to prepare more. Miraculously, the small amount of oil burned for the entire eight days, symbolising hope and perseverance.

Lessons of Hanukkah:

• Hope Against Adversity: Hanukkah teaches us that even in the darkest of times, hope can shine through. The Maccabees never gave up, reminding us to persevere in the face of challenges.

- The Power of Unity: This celebration also highlights the strength found in unity. When people come together, incredible things can happen.
- Spreading Light: Another essential lesson of Hanukkah is to share light and kindness. Each night, a candle on the menorah is lit, spreading warmth and hope.

We have dicussed how no matter how challenging things may seem, there is always hope.

Attendance








The whole school's attendance target is 96%. The whole school attendance for the year so far is **94.3%**. Unfortunately, our persistent absence is **19%**. Please ensure your child comes to school every day.

So far this academic year, we have had 16 families taking unauthorised leave in term time (holidays). This has resulted in £2932 in fixed penalty notices issued by Birmingham City Council. We ask that families do not take leave in term time as these will not be authorised by school.

Birmingham Public Health

Birmingham Public Health have asked if all schools can pass on the following message.

They are encouraing that all parents and carers check that their child has been vaccinated. Parents can check the personal child health record (the Red Book) or if this doesn't help, speak to their GP surgery. Parents can contact their GP surgery to catch their child up, at any age, or indeed, for themselves.

Measles is highly infectious (it can spread easily from person to person). While most people recover completely within a couple of weeks, measles can cause serious illness and in rare cases it can be fatal. Vaccination with two doses of MMR is the only way to give people maximum protection.

The first signs of measles are:

- high temperature
- runny or blocked nose
 - sneezing
 - cough
- red, sore, watery eyes

• rash usually appears a few days after cold-like symptoms (sometimes starts around the ears before spreading to rest of the body)

Measles can cause complications, especially in certain at-risk groups that include babies and small children, pregnant women and people with weak immunity.

Further important information

The MMR vaccine

If your child has not received two doses of MMR vaccination as part of their childhood immunisation programme, you should take up the offer of the MMR vaccine for your child now. If you are not sure if your child needs an MMR vaccine, you can contact your GP to check.

The MMR vaccination is the best way to protect against measles as it is:

effective
safe and
free of charge

The vaccine provides effective protection against three diseases – measles, mumps and rubella. The first dose of MMR is given soon after the first birthday. A second dose is normally given before school entry. However, you can have the MMR vaccine at any age. If either you or your child are not fully protected against measles (two doses of MMR), you can contact your GP surgery to arrange vaccination. It is never too late to get vaccinated. Two doses of MMR are required to produce satisfactory protection against measles, mumps and rubella. If your family avoids pork, a MMR vaccine is available that does not contain any pork products.

This is especially important when measles is circulating because any child or adult who has not had at least one dose of MMR and comes into contact with a person with measles will have to be excluded from nursery, school or work for 21 days and stay at home.

What to do if you think your child has measles

If your child develops symptoms, you should contact your GP. You must contact the surgery by telephone before visiting and tell the reception staff that you think that your child may have measles and not attend the surgery unless you are asked to. The doctor will make special arrangements to see your child so that, if they have measles, they won't pass it to others.

People with measles will remain infectious, and so be able to pass on the disease to others for 4 days after the start of the rash. Therefore, it is important that anyone with measles stays away from nursery, school, group activities, gatherings or anywhere with people outside of the household during that time.

What is happening in the classroom?

Nursery

The nursery children have enjoyed playing in our new role play area this week. Santa's workshop has come to the nursery classroom and the children have been practising their wrapping skills, decorating the tree and designing their own toys for Santa to make.

We have also written letters to Santa and posted them in our nursery postbox. The children then made their own handprint Christmas card that they will be bringing home at the end of the half term.

We have been practising rhyming words during phonics this week. The children have been trying to think of words that sound similar and helped Miss Coe find rhyming objects inside the magic treasure chest.

In Maths, we have been continuing practising subitising numbers to 5 using a dice to look at number patterns and have been introduced to a 10 frame to help us with counting objects.

Reception

RG

This week we have been learning about our new book in Literacy called Star in a Jar. We have been identifying the four main parts of the story and drawing them. We have also been working hard to practice our Nativity.

RS

This week we have been learning about winter. We have been thinking about how we dress for winter now that it has got much colder and comparing this to how we would dress in summer. We have had lots of fun exploring the weather outside this week by using magnifying glasses to look at the icicles. 1F

This week we have been exploring numbers to 20. Children have been looking at both the numerical and word form. In RE this week the children have been looking at ways we can help Gods creation (the earth and all within it). Children discussed ways to look after the planet such as recycling, turning off lights, turning taps off and riding a bike instead of using a car.

1M

In Year 1 this week, we have been planning our own story in English. The children are re-telling the story of Rapunzel but changing the characters. They have been super at using adjectives to describe their new characters. In Maths the children have been looking at numbers to 20 and using different resources to make these numbers such as counters, cubes and numicon.

Year 2

2K

We have been working very hard in 2K in Maths this week. We have been subtracting 2 digit numbers crossing 10 this is a new concept so we have been practising lots this week. We have also starting to prepare to write a diary. The children have been working very hard to do this.

2R

Its been a busy week in 2R this week. We have worked super hard in Maths subtracting 2-digit numbers crossing 10. We have also been carrying on with our History unit on The Great Fire of London. The children love sharing their knowledge on this now.

Year 3

3D

In science, the children have been looking at light and how dark is the absence of light. We used a cardboard box with an object inside and two holes on either side to show what we could see when there wasn't a source of light and what we could see when a flash light was used.

In writing this week, we have been writing contrasting character descriptions of the Fox and Magpie. In Maths, we have been learning our 8 times tables. If you could continue to practise times tables at home with the children, that would be fab.

Year 4

4J

This week, children in 4J have been working hard on their 12 times tables and using the problem solving and reasoning skills in maths. During our handball tournament this week, children were incredible at showing their skills they have learnt and developed over this half-term. Next week we will be starting our new topic badminton - please have a change of trainer or pumps for the hall please. This week, year 4 have been working hard on their times tables in maths, with a focus on the 12x tables. In writing, we are have been building up to writing our information reports which we will be writing next week. The children have been using their scientific skills in science by creating a simple circuit and testing to see which materials are conductors and which are insulators. We have finished our handball module in PE, wrapping it up with a tournament with everyone displaying some excellent skills.

In science we experimented with the pulleys and how they can impact weight bearing in every day life. Year 6


6H

What you need to bring to school

A reminder of what to bring to school:

 \checkmark A water bottle (please make sure it has yourname on it). This should only have water in it and have a pop up top (not a screw top as if these fall over on the desks, they will ruin the children's work).

 \checkmark A school bag or bookbag.

√ A healthy fruit snack for breaktime (Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are provided with this).

 \checkmark You can bring your scooter or bike to school if you wish. Please remember to wear a helmet and not to ride them whilst on school grounds.

X As always, please remember not to bring in any toys or stationery from home, unless it has been specifically requested by your teacher.

X No non-prescribed medication. Any medication that has been prescribed must be handed by the parent/carer to the school office staff who will ask you to complete a medication form detailingpermission and dosage.

Medical and Dietary Information

It is very important that we have up-to-date medical information including new Care Plans so we will be sending these out for you to review, complete and return. Any other updated health information should be sent in via the school office.

Please remember to inform the school of any changes to your child's medical or dietary needs.

Please also ensure that any prescribed medication, including an inhaler or EpiPen, is in-date and in school - it is parents responsibility to ensure this.

Free School Meals, Toast and Price Changes

All children in Year's Reception - Year 2 are entitled to a 'Universal Free School Meal'.

When a child enters Year 3 this entitlement ends. If you would like your child to receive a school dinner your will need to:

- Check you eligibility for a FSM here: <u>Online FSM Application (cloudforedu.org.uk)</u> School will be notified of the outcome of your application and proceed accordingly.
- Top up your 'School Food United' account to ensure there are funds to pay for your child's meals. The price for a school meal for the academic year 23/24 is £2.80 per day. Remember that these need to be ordered by **8.30 am** each day.

• We will no longer be accepting cash for toast, this will also need to be ordered each down through 'School Food United' The cost per day is 25p. Children will receive their toast at their break time between around 10.30am. Remember that these need to be ordered by **8.30 am** each

• We sent out guidance of how to create/use your 'School Food United' app via Arbor last week - if you require any further assistance please speak to a member of the school office.

Birthdays

Natasha's Law came into effect on 1st October 2021. We appreciate that there may be some special times throughout the year when children may wish to bring sweets or chocolate in to share with their friends (e.g birthdays), please may we ask that children only bring in prepacked sweets such as Haribos which can then be handed out at the end of the day before children go and see their parents or guardians. Please understand that we cannot accept any homemade or individual sweets as this will not comply with Natasha's Law or current allergen requirements.

Nut Free School

A reminder that the school is a nut-free zone as several children and members of staff have severe nut allergies. Please make sure that no nuts are brought to school and please check the ingredients on packets carefully. Thank you for helping us to keep all our community safe.

School Uniform

- White polo shirt (with/without logo).
- Red sweatshirt or cardigan (with or without logo).
 - Grey or black trousers, skirt or pinafore.
 - Red and white check dress (summer).
 - Grey or black shorts (summer).
 - Black shoes.



P.E Uniform

- Red or black shorts.
- White t-shirt (with or without the school logo).
 - Black bumps/trainers.
- Black tracksuit bottoms for outdoor games in winter.

Pumps are needed for indoor PE and must come in a separate bag for children to change into for the lesson. Trainers are not to be worn inside. Please make sure that your child has a pair of pumps onsite in case the weather means we need to do P.E inside.

You can also purchase a hoodie with the school logo on for P.E. from the office. This is not compulsory.



Labelling

We understand how much a new uniform and school items cost and we try our best to ensure the children look after their clothing and bags. Please label your child's clothing, bags, lunch boxes, shoes and water bottles to help us return lost items to their owner.
