The St Michael's Way. Our Behaviour Curriculum

At St Michael's, we develop children's character and Christian spirit through our behaviour curriculum, called, 'The St Michael's Way'.

Staff teach weekly behaviour lessons focusing on a different aspect of the Behaviour Curriculum.

Teachers will demonstrate these behaviours and ensure pupils have time to practise these.

The role of Parents and Carers

Crucial in developing and maintaining good relationships, behaviour and successful learning and outcomes. We work with parents to:

- Take part in the life of the school
- Support the school help your child follow the school rules and achieve their best
- Build positive relationships with the school and work together so that your child receives consistent messages
- Attend all parental consultations and meetings during the year
- Celebrate your child's successes in school





Parent Code of Conduct

- **Positive Partnerships First**: BDMAT values strong, respectful relationships between home and school. This policy supports a safe and supportive environment for all, while ensuring that concerns are addressed constructively.
- Clear Expectations for Conduct: Behaviours such as aggression, harassment, discriminatory language, or misuse of social media are not acceptable. Everyone is expected to communicate respectfully and responsibly, both in person and online.
- Supportive but Firm Responses: If behaviour falls short of expectations, the Trust may take steps such as offering mediation, issuing warnings, or applying restrictions—always with the aim of restoring positive engagement.
- Transparency and Accountability: All actions taken under this policy are recorded and reviewed regularly. Parents and carers are kept informed and have the right to raise concerns through appropriate channels.

The importance of good attendance

- Children have the right to attend school and receive a full time education
- Good attendance gives your child the chance to achieve their best
- Attendance below 90% is classed as persistently absent (PA) - one day a fortnight being missed!
- St Michael's current PA is 18%!
- Class teachers receive a half termly update with the details of the PA children in the class




Attendance – Fixed Penalty Notices

The National Framework for Penalty Notices was introduced across England in 2024.

- Under the new framework:
- The penalty will increase to £80 if paid within 21 days, or £160 if paid after 21 days but within 28 days.
- If the penalty is not paid within 28 days, the local authority will have to decide whether to prosecute for the original offence or withdraw the notice.
- This change is being made by the Department for Education, not by our school.





Our School Rules

At St Michael's CE Primary School, our learning behaviours are:





STAR Behaviour

Children will be encouraged to exhibit STAR behaviours. When pupils are noticed for exhibiting the star behaviours, they will move up the Zone Board.





Zone Board

Each classroom has a behaviour board which contains a Zone Board. Each child starts in the green zone and can move up the Zone Board for showing positive behaviour.

Each new day is a fresh start.

I am outstanding. I am a role model. I am ready, respectful and responsible.



Staff will explicitly teach the children the appropriate voice levels for different activities.

Children are expected to use Marvellous Manners at all times both in and out of the classroom.



We ask children to tell an adult if they are struggling (this may be with another pupil) or with their own behaviour. We ask them to make the 'A' choice.



A Stepped Approach



Mobile phones

- Children should only bring a phone if they travel home on their own.
- Phones must be handed to the class teacher at the start of the day and will be returned at home time.
- If a child is found with a phone during the day or on the playground without permission, it will be kept in the office for a parent/carer to collect.
- Phones are brought in at your own risk. The school cannot take responsibility for loss or damage.





Social Media & WhatsApp

- We know many children use apps like WhatsApp to chat with friends.
- These apps have age restrictions, and we encourage parents to monitor their child's use.
- The school will not get involved in disputes that happen on these platforms outside of school.
- If issues between parents or children spill into school or onto the playground, we will refer to our Parent Code of Conduct.
- We will always support any child affected by something they've seen online.




P.E Kit

In the Autumn Term children will start to take part in P.E lessons in the main hall or outdoors. For these lessons all children must come into school wearing their PE kit. Labelling

Water and Snacks

You are asked to send in a water bottle each day and children are encouraged to drink throughout the day. The bottles are kept in a basket in the classroom. Please label your child's bottle to ensure they can find it.

You can order your child toast through Arbor for 25p per day. Alternatively, they can bring a healthy snack such as

fruit.















Lunch

You will need to order the school meal through Arbor. If you wish to provide your child with a packed lunch the lunch boxes should be **nut free and kiwi free** to ensure there are no issues with allergies. Water should be provided for lunch time.





Lunchtime

Splitting lunchtime so that children have plenty of time to eat, play and get ready for learning in the afternoon.

This is to ensure that:

- Children have a calm afternoon;
- Children are ready to learn
- Conflicts from the playground have been resolved.

- Extra curricular activities- choir and others added throughout the year.





School Development Plan

Writing

We are improving how writing is taught across all year groups:

- Improve handwriting, spelling, and sentence structure across all year groups.
- Introduce 'Little Wandle Spelling' and 'Ready Steady Spell' to support spelling development.
- Provide targeted support for pupils with additional needs in writing.
- Model planning, drafting, and editing using example texts.



School Development Plan 2025-2026

Reading

We are helping pupils become more fluent and confident readers:

- Use 'Little Wandle' and 'Ready Steady Read' to support reading fluency and comprehension.
- Teach strategies to help pupils understand and discuss what they read.
- Explore AI tools to help pupils answer comprehension questions more clearly and accurately.

Mathematics

We are updating the maths curriculum to better meet pupils' needs:

- Focus on fluency, reasoning, and problem-solving in every year group.
- Use pupil feedback and assessment data to guide teaching and close learning gaps.
- Provide additional support for pupils who need help with key concepts.

Pupil Wellbeing and Safeguarding

We are strengthening our pastoral team and safeguarding systems:

- Recruit new staff and train current team members in safeguarding and wellbeing.
- Improve attendance monitoring and provide support for families.
- Ensure pupils feel safe, happy, and ready to learn.

Curriculum Enhancements

We are improving how we teach key subjects:

- RE: Teach Christianity as a global faith and include non-religious worldviews.
- Science: Simplify topics and introduce sustainability themes.
- PSHE: Update curriculum to reflect current guidance on relationships, health, and wellbeing.
- Art: Streamline planning and improve resources to support creativity.

Teaching and Learning

We are embedding a clear framework for excellent teaching:

- Train staff in inclusive teaching practices and effective feedback.
- Ensure lessons are engaging, supportive, and accessible for all learners.
- Promote consistency and high standards in teaching and learning.
